I am writing in my capacity as Chairman of the All Party Parliamentary Group for Tamils.

We note recent media reports that Sri Lankan President Gotabaya Rajapaksa has informed the United Nations representative in the country that tens of thousands of Tamils still missing after the end of the war in 2009 are dead. The President reportedly declared that most of the missing had been "taken by the LTTE or forcefully conscripted" and that steps would be taken to issue death certificates.

The way the Sri Lankan President announced this grave news, with no due process, has deeply upset the tens of thousands of mothers, fathers, sons and daughters who have been searching for their loved ones and calling for their release.

We note that many of the disappeared were reportedly seen surrendering to the Sri Lankan military forces. Alternatively they were taken from the camps in which all survivors were held by men identified by eye-witnesses as being affiliated with the government. Thus many of the individual's families are still searching for the 'disappeared' in government custody. Given these facts, we call on the Foreign Secretary to seek clarification on the following:

- 1. What records exists to establish when and how these people died?
- 2. How many individuals that were missing are dead and what are their details?
