Public appeal to all concerned

We appeal to heads of all four religious faiths in Sri Lanka to take meaningful steps to arrest the ever progressing extremism of handful of their members. Interfaith hate, intolerance and politicisation of religious paths are seriously conflicting with core values of love, peace, tolerance and harmony promoted by all religions.

The Article 9 of the constitution of Sri Lanka enshrines foremost place for Buddhism and emphasize that State protect and foster the teaching of Buddha. Teaching of Buddha are four noble truths and the noble eightfold path and it contradicts with the hate driven extremism practiced by some monks with the support of politicians and hooligans.

Articles 10 and 14(1)(e) of the constitution provides minimum safeguards for every person to be entitled to freedom of thought, conscience and religion, including the freedom to have or to adopt a religion or belief of his choice and that every citizen is entitled to the freedom, either by himself or in association with others, and either in public or in private, to manifest his religion or belief in worship, observance, practice or teaching. Extremism of few extremists Buddhist monks with the patronage of the state is undermining this very safeguarding provision in the constitution.

We are pained that core principles of peaceful practice and propagation of religions enshrined in the constitution is being blatantly undermined by the handful of extremists preachers in the very eyes of the government and its law enforcement agencies.

We note with considerable concern that extremist Buddhist monks are taking the law into their hands and undermining the very constitutional safeguards to illegally construct a Buddhist shrine by destroying a popular Hindu temple for Ganesha in the land owned by the Hindus in Kanniya in Trincomalee with the backing of exclusively Buddhist Archaeological Department.

Sincere intervention of Hinduism Minister Mano Ganeshan paved the way for the President to publicly admit unwarranted intrusion by the Buddhist monks and declare remedial measures to respond to the crisis. Whatever said, we have great doubt that the President's intervention will lead to a meaningful resolution as we consider it a knee jerk reaction for immediate crisis management like the unfulfilled public undertaking of the Prime Minister to deal with the crisis in Kalmunai within a month.

We also appeal to the Buddhist hierarchical Sangas representing around 6,000 Buddhist monasteries with approximately 15,000 monks to develop religious regulatory mechanisms to manage and discipline the straying monks to ensure Buddha's teachings are practiced in religious sense.
